Historic Recognition

The Russell County Historical Society welcomes the Gernon House to the listing on the Register of Historic Kansas Places and is on the state's official list of properties deemed significant to our past.



The Nicholas Gernon house was also nominated and accepted to be on the National Register of Historic Places.

The Gernon House. Nicholas Gernon, one of the colonists to settle Russell, built Gernon House in 1872. In 1871, Gernon, a blacksmith, came with The Northwest Colony from Ripon, Wisconsin to establish a new community. Gernon and other colonists lived in the railroad boxcars that brought them until they could build their homes. Due to the lack of available trees and lumber, the colonists were forced to use local limestone for construction. Many of these homes are still in service, as well as the courthouse, Fossil Station Museum, schools, and other prominent buildings. The walls in many cases measure over 24" thick. Several sidewalks were laid using limestone and are still visible today.

The house has been beautifully restored to its original condition and is a must see for visitors. The house is in need of painting and if you or your organization are interested, please notify the historical society. Donations to this project can qualify you for historic tax credits as well. The Gernon Blacksmith Shop site is adjacent to the house and a beautiful visitors center, Russell Rotary Splash pad, and historic play area named the Henri Wenthe Play Park are located where the site of the Blacksmith Shop once was.

Oil Patch Damage

Damage to an Oil Patch artifact is a result of a catapulting semi-truck tire flying off the interstate at some unknown time in January. We are fortunate the building was not hit for the damage would have been substantial.

OUR HISTORY IN THE OIL INDUSTRY Celebrating 100 Years of Oil in Russell County November 2023

Russell tells the story of how oil is found and refined, and showcases historical artifacts pertaining to finding and drilling for oil. The museum tells the story of the Lucky Seven members and the drilling of the Carrie Oswald #1 oil well. The Carrie Oswald was the first discovery well drilled in November 23, 1923, in Russell County which opened petroleum drilling to 2/3rds of Kansas. Visitors can see exhibits on the drilling and production of oil as well as taking an outdoor tour of cable tool drilling rigs, rotary drilling rigs, pulling units, steam engines, and pump jacks used throughout history.

This guide was originally created by Russell Main Street, Inc., which funded the Lamp Posts in Russell through donations.

1. This memorial pays tribute to all Russell County Veterans who served their country. American Legion William Roe Post No. 99 Veterans Day Nov. 11, 2000.

2. Elmer Steinle - Thank you from your American Legion Friends of William Roe Post No. 99 Veterans Day Nov 11, 2000.

3. County - Russell County was Established, July 18, 1872. The Governor appointed the first Russell County Commissioners. The County Courthouse was located in Bunker Hill. Russell had the majority in the April 23, 1874, election and was declared the county seat. County officers were ordered to move all property belonging to Russell County.

4. Russell County Convention & Visitors Bureau - The CVB actively promotes Russell County attractions worldwide. The Russell County CVB receives its operating funds from a transient guest tax collected by the motels, hotels, inns and bed and breakfast establishments located throughout the county.

5. Robert and Lyla (Prater) Schmitt - We picked placement in front of the church where we were both baptized confirmed and married. St. John Lutheran Church has been an important part of our lives. The family farm south of Gorham, where we have spent most of our lives, is also rich in history. The Butterfield Overland Dispatch passed north of our farmstead.

6. The Horns of Russell, Fred M. and Bertha Henning Horn; Emanuel and Mary Milberger Dumler; Karl F. and Winifred Horn; Max P. Horn and Whilmetta Dumler Horn; Willima D. Horn.

7. To Alice Mills "Teacher" was high praise. She was proud and humble

almost to a fault. Alice had a way with words most of us Would "Die" for. To her legion of friends, she was a Legend. Her ability to recall names, lineage, and personal data was uncanny. Alice married Chet Mills. They enjoyed their short life together.

8. Jane Holland - For my son, Andrew C. Holland, and my daughter Jill A. Holt.

9. Alva and Margaretta Billings, Pioneer Oil and Gas operators lived in Russell from the mid 1930's to their respective deaths in 1950 and 1971. They loved Russell and everything about it. Their sons, Richard and Bob Billings, grew up in the family home at 120 Elm Street.

10. Masonic Lodge 177 - In memory of all past Master Masons and dedicated to all future Master Masons.

11. In Memory of Wilbur H. Morris, Sr. and Beulah B. Morris who in addition to an optometric practice of 26 years were active members of the First Methodist Church, W.S.C.S, Eastern Star, Masonic Lodge and Rotary International. By Dale M. Morris and Dr. W.H. Morris Jr.

12. The Ralph Jordan Family.

13. In Loving Memory of LaVern Becker by his wife, children, and grandchildren. Lavern Becker was a farmer and stockman in southern Russell County but took an active interest in the activities of The City of Russell and Russell County. He served as County Commissioner; Chamber of Commerce Director; Prairiesta Chairman; Main Street Board of Directors and 4-H Fair Board and Development Board.

14. David Ochs, 1987-1945, was born on a homestead farm in Southern Russell County, the son of Volga German immigrants. As a young man he acquired a business education in



Salina, then he served in the Army in World War I. Shortly after returning home, he left his farming interests and entered the automobile business with Victor P. Dolecek. In 1923 they obtained a Chevrolet franchise, later building a dealership at 7th and Kansas streets. David bought out his partner in 1939 and continued the business until his untimely death, He was greatly loved and respected by many, including. His five children, Ruth, Lawrence, Harlan, Kenneth, and Donald.

15. Dedicated to the faithful customers and employees that had made our business a success for the past 20 years and a Sears store and Hometown Brand Center. With deep appreciation to all, Richard and Anna Cross.

16. Roger William - Williams was mayor of the City of Russell from 1965 through 1985. He held city, state, and national offices during his time in Russell. Roger's greatest interests were his family, the First Christian Church, and the City of Russell.

17. KRSL AM 990 Established 1956 KCAY FM 95.9 Established 1965, Owner at the time West Central Radio General Manager Wayne Grabbe Russell County Man of the Year 1999.

18. In this native limestone and brick building in 1881, The L. Banker Merc. Co. was founded by Louis "Lou" Banker. Through wars, depressions, dust storms, oil booms and harvests Banker's was one of Russell's leading merchants. Housewives, farmers, oil patch hands and school children were our customers and were greeted as friends; For many they experienced buying on credit for the first time. On rare but necessary occasions even short-term cash loans were made to those in need. From christening to final rest, Banker's was the place to purchase all the family clothing and home furnishing needs., From the beginning; management and their employees were always enthusiastic supporters of any activities that were for the betterment of Russell. Bankers was always a hometown store.

19. G.W. and Maggie Barr Holland; Clifford R. and Lucile Heym Holland; Georgiana W. and D. Frank Bell; Herbert N. and Helen Shaffer Holland; Michael S. and Nancy Gaines Holland; Catherine and Georgia Holland.

20. Russell "Newsly" Townsley Curmudgeon, donated by Russ Townsley.

21. R.J. "Rudy" and Hermine (Deines) Woelk. Rudy was a prominent Russell Businessman and civic leader. He was active in the Chamber of Commerce chairing various committees., A past commander of the American Legion and president of the local Kiwanis club. He also headed one of Russell's oldest business firms started by his father in the early 1870's, Woelk Implement.

22. Alvina S. Deines (1909-1988) was born and raised in Russell County, Kansas. She was the eighth child of G.J. and Catherine Deines. As a young woman, she, along with her brother Hubert, spent a number of years on the staff of the Kansas City Star newspaper. She later returned to Russell to manage the family home, where she resided for the rest of her life. Alvina worked in the Deines Brothers Furniture business and was well-known in the community. She was a scholar of culture and history and was an active member of Russell's Prairie Study Club. Alvina never married but devoted most of her life to caring for her family and others.

23. Loren Dinkel for faithful service to his community. Russell City Council. 1977-1985; Russell Mayor 1985- 1977 General Manager AGCO Inc. 1985-1996.

24. In Memory of Doran and Bina Dole-donated by Senator Bob Dole.

25. In Memory of O. H. "Herb" and Bertha Deines from their loving family.

26. Fern G. Moore was born, 1915, in Russell, Kansas: The youngest of the ten children of G.J. and Catherine Deines. In 1938 she married Russell businessman, Paul Moore. They were married 59 years and had one child: Kathleen born in 1948. Fern was active in the community and in the Deines family businesses for most of her life. She was a member of the First Congregational Church and served on the Board of Directors of the Deines Cultural Center until her death, age 81, in 1991.

27. Ruth Ochs Wolfe, 1920-1988, a Russell native and lifelong resident, actively volunteered her time and services to most worthwhile facets of community life, and was a staunch friend to many in the area, especially those in need, lonely or in sorrow. In 1980 she was named

Russell County "Man of the Year". Her husband, Donald E. Wolfe, moved from Oklahoma in 1937 to Russell, adopted it as his beloved home, and became a longtime local sports booster and a respected retired member of the Kansas oil industry. Ruth and Don were married in the Chapel of Trinity Methodist Church, 6th and Main, in 1939.

28. Donors: Jerome and June Deines are graduates of Russell High School and were married in Russell. They have three children and presently are residents and in business in Pauls Valley, OK. Jerome's parents (Mr. and Mrs. Bernhardt Deines) were engaged in farming south of Russell. June's Parents (Mr. and Mrs. Amos Norris) were engaged in the oilfield business in Russell (The Norris Tool Co.).

29. Bud and Barney Roberts.

30. In Memory of Charles W. and Catherine H. Shaffer, Daughter Helen M. Holland, Son Wilmer R. (Bub). He was a member of the "Lucky Seven" - Promoted the first oil well in Russell County.

31. Anthony "Tony" Witt and Ethel M. Waudby Witt started their marriage on a farm southeast of Gorham, Kansas. When the oil boom hit Russell County, Tony had the courage and foresight to independently drill his own wells on his own land. With his success, he invested in land. He moved his family of six children, Evelyn Meckel, Beatrice Davis, Ellen Grass, Lorraine Wilson, Anthony Jr., and Cecil to Russell in 1933. In 1940, he built a beautiful large home on First and Main Street in Russell.

32. Father Charles L. Steier "Father Charlie"- Unless the Lord guard the city in vain does the guard keep vigil PSALMS 127:2.

33. Donald H. Dumler b. 3-18-1928. Third child of John and Amelia (Herdt) Dumler. 1946 graduate of RHS and served in the US Navy from 1950-1954 as part of the FT2 Fox Div. aboard the USS Rochester (CA-124). In 1956 he married Beverly Layton. He was the father of Nancy Lynn (b. 1967) and David Layton (b.1970). He worked at JC Penney and owned Baskin Robbins for 31 years. He was a Christian, a singer, a volunteer, a gardener, a husband, and a dad.

34. John O. Farmer, Inc. Gas and Oil Producers in Russell County since 1946. A family business founded by John O. Farmer II (1910-1989). The current President and Chairman of the Board is John O. Farmer III. The current Vice-President is John O. Farmer IV. Mary Lyczak and Victor Lyczak II are members of the board. Rosemary Farmer was a past member of the board.

35. Four Holland Generations of Law: George W., Herbert N., Michael S. and Michael S. II. Donated by: Michael S. and Nancy Gaines Holland; their children Michael S. II and Gene Gaines Holland.

36. In Loving memory of George W. and Maggie B. Holland, Russell Pioneers, From their grandson George W. Holland III.

37. GAMMA ZETA SORORITY was chartered in October of 1949 as GAMMA THETA, it started with 15 members. In 1978 they changed to an Exemplar Chapter and became GAMMA ZETA, and then in 1988 they became a Preceptor Chapter. Gamma Zeta Sorority is a branch of Beta Sigma Phi. With the money-making projects they contribute to many service needs in the Russell Community.

38. Cindy Ewing dedicates this lamp post to her parents Kate Lee and Ralph Ewing. Kate Lee Culbertson Ewing was raised in a pioneer family in Russell. She graduated from Russell High School in 1919. In 1937 she met and married Ralph and returned to Russell. Ralph worked for Banker's Dept Store and served as Russell County Clerk during the remodeling of the courthouse. They were team players supporting the arts, education, First Congregational Church and the Russell County Historical Society with their time, talents and resources, Kate Lee served as Russell's official city historian form 1982-1987.

39. In memory of Gottfried and Mollie Stricker by their children Rozella, Helen, Elmer, Lenetta, Harvey, Elsena, Glen, Bob, Mary Jane, Dean, Tom, Kathryn, Fritz.

40. UMB Bank has been a hallmark for financial products and services since 1879 when Rufus Crosby, a dry goods merchant in Valley Falls, KS., bought a small bank. 45. Russ and Ruth Harvey - Russell, Kansas a community that works together through good and bad times; if you give your effort to it will repay tenfold; A Town That will never die.

46. Jim and Cheryl Line moved to Russell in 1963 with the Oil Industry; raised four children, Meridy, Rick, Steve, and Kristy. Jim was an Olympic athlete and Cheryl taught piano and accompanied numerous concerts and plays.

47. The Shields Building site was originally the first Russell Hospital. When construction was completed on South Main, this hospital was converted to the Munsell Apartments until remodeled as offices for Shields Oil Producers in 1953. The refurbished building also housed Medical and Dental offices.

48. In loving Memory of Augusta Casing Crew-given by Fred J. Haynes.

49. Dr. Michael and Paula, Courtney and Christopher "Kit" Jones moved to Russell in 1989. Michael, originally from Livonia Mo. is a dentist. Paula, originally from Colby has been active "beautifying Russell one house at a time!" Our family feels very fortunate to have found Russell and to be a part of it. We have made many great friends. We are happy to be able to give something back to the community.

50. Frank Perano, Public Works Director City of Russell 1955 to 1999, 44 years of dedicated service to the citizens of Russell, KS.

51. The first lamppost dedicated was to Earl L. Homewood, city Electric Director. Among the numerous electrical changes made under the direction of Homewood was an increase in power capacity from 17,500KW to 28,000KW, development of two industrial sites, a city loop, and the addition of two cooling towers. For his efforts and accomplishments in the municipal utility field statewide, he received the highest award given by Kansas Municipal Utilities, Inc., the Edgar P. Schowalter Award.

52. An Ornamental Lamppost is installed near the municipal swimming pool at Memorial Park in grateful appreciation of the generosity of Francis L. "Duke" Johnson. At "Duke's " death in 1984, he bequeathed the major portion of his estate in trust for the City of Russell to receive the income annually forever.
